#### **Arizona Voter Opinions on Consumer Issues**

**Consumer Choice Center Survey Summary** 

Submitted by OH Predictive Insights to Consumer Choice Center, February 2018







#### **Executive Summary**

When it comes to advancing technology and regulations, younger voters seem more prone to accepting the new technologies of self-driving cars, and the legalization of cannabis. This and the desire to protect laws concerning societal values seems to have a much higher impact on Republican or conservative voters than the need for deregulation. Additionally, results showed that deregulations in the form of dental therapists are highly opposed across the board. Though not by huge margins, women are also more skeptical of implementing newer technologies into Arizona.

- Partisan affiliation and age change state outlook, in a slightly contradictory manner— When questioned if they believe Arizona is headed in the right direction or on the wrong track, close to half of Republicans believed the state was headed in the right direction (49%), while Democrats (46%) and Independents (45%) saw Arizona on the wrong track. Though Republicans are typically older, those that were 45 to 64, and 65 years old and older had majorities believe Arizona is on the wrong track, while a majority of 35 to 44 year olds (54%) and a plurality of 18-34 year olds (45%) thought Arizona was headed in the right direction.
- Older voters are more skeptical of regulating and taxing cannabis like alcohol, but not necessarily opposed When asked if Arizonans back a proposal to regulate and tax cannabis like alcohol, support among those 65 years and older is lower than younger people at a net of +12 compared to the rest which have net support at about +50. The opposition doesn't rise, but rather one in five (20%) responded with a Not Sure opinion, and it was higher among 65 and older in the Pima (48.4%) and Rural (22.9%) regions.
- Support for gambling outside reservations becomes more polarized as income level increases When asked if the State Legislature should allow forms of gambling from fantasy football to casinos outside of reservations, support fell incrementally as the income level rose. One in four (26%) voters somewhat supported gambling among those earning 25K or less. Within the same group, about half either strongly supported gambling or somewhat opposed it.



# • Widespread opposition to dental therapists and licensing led by women and older people — When asked if voters would support a proposal to allow for a dental therapist to perform treatments, some irreversible, but do not require as much training, most women were strongly opposed to the proposal (53%) — majority of those 45-64 (53%) and 65 and older (58%). These subgroups are also the only ones that have a majority in total opposition when the question is asked whether a respondent would support or oppose a bill currently in the State Legislature to allow licensing for dental therapists.

- Eight in ten young voters support renting out their home for short periods of time When questioned if voters approve or disapproves of a recent law that allows someone to voluntarily rent out their apartment or house for a short period of time, eight in ten (80%) voters age 18 to 34 supported this and three in four (75%) of 35-44 year olds also back it. In the 45 and older demographic, opposition rises but support falls heavily into the Somewhat Supports column.
- Age gap dominates support for self-driving cars When asked if safety regulations are followed, self-driving cars should be allowed on the roads, an easy majority of those 18-34 (62%) and 35-44 years old (65%) support this proposal, but a majority of those age 45-64 (51%) and 65 and up (55%) oppose the measure.


These observations are based on a live and automated caller survey conducted by Phoenix based-OH Predictive Insights on February 7<sup>th</sup> and 8th, 2018, from an active Arizona registered voter sample. The sample size was 601 completed surveys, with a MoE of +/-4%. 40% of surveys were conducted on cell phones and 60% via landlines. The party affiliation, geographic, gender and age demographics accurately reflect active registered voters in Arizona in this sample.

**Question -** Generally speaking, would you say that things in Arizona are going in the right direction or have they gotten off track?





Question - Would you support or oppose a proposal that Arizona regulate and tax cannabis like alcohol?


















